At the suggestion of the Superintendent the attention of the Corps is called to the regulations relating to the duties of sentinels. The punishment of sentinels for deserting or sleeping on their posts has been lighter than the regulations prescribe, but in future sentinels guilty of such an offence must be promptly reported to the Superintendent for dismissal. In the Army, for a sentinel to desert or sleep on his post is one of the gravest offences, and is punished by death. The propriety of enforcing the regulations in such cases is therefore apparent.
